- 1. That Phelps County Road 6010 is wholly contained within the East Half of Section 5, Township 36 North, Rane 8 West of the $5^{\rm th}$ P.M., in Phelps County, Missouri, and wholly within the Spring Creek East Township.
- 2. That Phelps County Road 6010 is situated outside the Limits of any incorporated town, village, or city.
- 3. That said Phelps County Road 6010 is a gravel road which point of beginning is on U.S. Highway 63 approximately one-eighth (1/8) of a mile west of the bridge over Little Piney Creek, then meandering in a southerly direction for approximately one-half (1/2) mile crossing the property of Theodore L. Miller, Jr. and Krista N. Miller, husband and wife, and Bortts, LLC and Phelps County Baptist Association, terminating on the property of Phelps County Baptist Association.
- $4\,.$ That the only landowners who use Phelps County Road 6010 to access their property are Theodore L. Miller, Jr. and Krista N. Miller, husband and wife, and Bortts, LLC and Phelps County Baptist Association.
- 5. That a copy of the Phelps County Assessor's map of County Road 6010 is attached hereto, labeled Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by reference.
- 6. That Petitioners are all residents of Spring Creek East Township, which is the township through which Phelps County Road $6010~\mathrm{runs}$.
- 7. That, even though Bortts, LLC and Phelps County Baptist Association are not "residents" of Spring Creek East Township, they join in this Petition as the remaining record owners of all of the real estate lying on both sides of and/or fronting Phelps County Road 6010.
- 8. That Phelps County Road 6010 is useless (as that term is Ch. 228.110 RSMo) as a public road, in that it serves no public use and is unnecessary and/or unrequired as a public road.

IN THE MATTER OF SHERIFF'S CREDIT CARD CHANGE:

Theresa Lasher of the Sheriff's Department brought paperwork to authorize leaving US Bank for credit card services for the Department; as moved by Commissioner Auxier and seconded by Commissioner Hicks this was approved. These are categorized as D2, D3 and D4; the Drought Monitor currently has south central Missouri in either D0 or D1.

IN THE MATTER OF JAIL EXPANSION:

Sheriff Kirn entered at 0910 and notified the Commission that the financing had been approved at a rate of 4%. Current jail census is over maximum at 215; he hopes staff will soon "make a DOC run" and reduce the population. Sheriff Kirn left at 0920 followed by the reporter.

IN THE MATTER OF FEDERAL FOREST COMMUNICATION:

The Commission was in receipt of communication from LeAnn Kaminski, Forest Realty Specialist with Mark Twain National Forest about easement documents for county right-of-way being prepared connected to the property of James Burgener of 14375 County Road 7550, Newburg, Missouri.

IN THE MATTER OF ARPA:

Treasurer Carol Green entered at 0950 to discuss recent information about use of the funds which was provided by NACO.

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY CLERK'S TURNOVER:

Pursuant to RSMo 50.370, the clerk presented June, 2022 fee breakdown and treasurer's receipts of \$1,925.00 for passport fees and \$18,657.65 for clerk fees.

IN THE MATTER OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT GRANT:

Phelps/Maries Health Department Director Ashley Campbell entered at 1125 to provide grant renewal paperwork involving an award of \$46,277 for Public Health Emergency Planning Grant. This was approved by Commissioner Auxier and seconded by Commissioner Hicks.

IN THE MATTER OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT LAB SERVICES:

Campbell discussed acquiring non-budgeted equipment costing several thousand dollars for more immediate lab results such as blood sugar and hemoglobin and, considering the relatively modest cost, she was encouraged to acquire it. In a year or two she is considering looking into bone density screening equipment, which would be of significant greater cost.

IN THE MATTER OF PERSONAL PROPERTY COURT ORDERS:

The Commission approved court orders numbered 2115 through 2118, for 2018 through 2021 add-on's, respectively, for June 2022.

IN THE MATTER OF PAYROLL:

Barnes reported on her planned attendance at the National Association of Counties (NACo) and National Association of County Collectors, Treasurers and Financial Officers (NACCTFO) meetings upcoming in Colorado.

IN THE MATTER OF COLLECTOR'S DELINQUENT TAX SALE:

Barnes shared information about her upcoming delinquent tax sale on August 22, 2022 and provided the Commissioners with her preliminary list of properties. Her first mailing has gone out. Local resident Chester Kojro entered at 0930.

IN THE MATTER OF BURN BAN:

The Commissioners discussed burn bans with Barnes and the others. Kirsten Karpowecz with Citizens Bank of The Midwest (formerly Citizens Bank of Newburg) entered at 0950 followed by Road Supervisor Mark Case and Michelle Bock of the Road & Bridge Department.

There was some deliberation between the Commission and Green about the amount of the ARPA balance, currently over \$8 million, to invest; the Commission favored \$5 million. The bid from Southern Bank was not received timely in the office of the County Clerk as specified at 10:00 so was not opened. Kirn and Lasher left at 1020 followed by Green.

IN THE MATTER OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT SICK LEAVE:

Phelps/Maries Health Department Director Ashley Campbell entered at 1100 and said she has three employees who are short 12, 17 and 28 hours respectively for absence while quarantined for Covid. She wonders if they can be permitted administrative leave and whether this will preserve their coverage under the Health Insurance plan. Administrative leave for health department workers was believed perfectly appropriate under the circumstances of their being quarantined.

IN THE MATTER OF COURTHOUSE PARKING LOT:

The sole proposal received from V Meyer Enterprises, LLC for \$25,000 to rehabilitate the parking lot was accepted as moved by Commissioner Auxier and seconded by Commissioner Hicks, provided the work can be done over a weekend. This vendor was contacted.

IN THE MATTER OF BRO SYSTEM BRIDGES:

Superintendent of Roads Mark Case and Michelle Bock of the Road and Bridge Department entered at 0905. Under a new system, Phelps County will need to compete with other counties for the funds. Prior rules have been rescinded. Case said that the Road 8410 bridge is a "goat path" and farm equipment often cannot traverse it. He thinks 2110 is not structurally as bad as the surface would suggest; bridge inspection reports seem to support this. It has been narrowed down to one lane because the sides have been repeatedly damaged by collisions. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp thinks that input can be given to the TAC Committee, but this input is spread across 8 counties. The bridges on 7460 and 3620 are the lowest for weight rating. Case would prioritize bridges on Roads 2110 and 3620. Kelly Sink at MRPC needs ROW easements, total length including approaches, any soft match, property acquisition costs. Bock asked about soft match and utility easements.

IN THE MATTER OF ROADS:

Case gave the Commission some updates on Road 8490. Patching in the north part of the county is ongoing. Road 2090 was done yesterday; Sho-Me Power had torn up the road with work on their substation and contributed financially to the repair. Asphalt patching is going over budget but this may be offset by the asphalt overlay being under. Road 7520 needs attention; Commissioner Hicks said there are multiple ruts which are quite deep. Multiple roads were discussed. Commissioner Hicks thought that milling Road 8010 and 2110 could be put out for bid; Case may be speaking soon to Capital Quarries regarding the cost and possibly a price for their purchase of the millings; use of ARPA funds and distribution of CART funds were both discussed.

IN THE MATTER OF CITIZEN INPUT (GEORGE POUNDS):

Local resident George Pounds entered at 0945 to express his concern about the report of a property owner on Pine Street having had unwanted entry into their business and later, as part of the same incident, perhaps a physical assault on a female bystander. Apparently there was no arrest made by Rolla Police. Pounds expressed concern and then left at 0950.

IN THE MATTER OF ROAD EQUIPMENT:

New road vehicles are very hard to obtain and some of the long-

range predictions for equipment acquisition provided by some vendors such as Mack Truck and Freightliner were discussed. Bock and Case left at 1000.

IN THE MATTER OF FLOODPLAIN TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE CONTRACT:

As moved by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner this agreement with Meramec Regional Planning Commission was approved.

IN THE MATTER OF MOU'S FOR SENIOR COMPANIONS:

IN THE MATTER OF CLOSED SESSION:

As moved by Commissioner Auxier and seconded by Commissioner Hicks, the meeting entered closed session pursuant to RSMo 610.021 (2) - real estate at 1000. No actions having been taken, the meeting returned to open session at 1014 as moved by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Auxier.

IN THE MATTER OF COURT ORDERS:

Court orders 2021000043 and 2021000044 were presented. The first of these corrected a clerical error which expressed a residential building value as \$396,000 with residential land of \$29,200 instead of \$39,600 and \$25,550, respectively, on parcel number 2020-8430. The second corrected a clerical error expressing a residential building value as \$455,400 with residential land of \$29,200 instead of \$45,500 and \$25,580, respectively, on parcel number 2021-8430. These court orders reduced the total property taxes by \$3,243.65 and \$3,634.64, respectively.

IN THE MATTER OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR COURT EXPENSES:

Public Administrator Dana Sooter entered at 1040 with several court bills for her and her office's representation by her attorney in a court case. The state ordered the county to serve a resident as guardian instead of the husband who, according to Sooter, does not understand Alzheimer's and was not felt suitable. Sooter explained that if there is neglect or abuse on a senior citizen, a hotline call is made, DHSS will investigate and will petition for guardianship. Many times, a suitable guardian can be found by DHSS but sometimes there is no one identified and the individual is assigned to the public administrator.

IN THE MATTER OF BOARD OF EQUALIZATION:

The Board of Equalization for 2022 convened at 0900. The clerk opened with brief remarks and administered the oaths to the members, who included the County Commission as well as County Surveyor Terris Cates and public members Jeff Davis and Brandon Biele. Deputy Assessor Paul Long and GIS Coordinator Tim Kean of the Assessor's office were also present. Commissioner Hicks moved, and Commissioner Auxier, seconded the nomination of Randy Verkamp as chair; voice vote was unanimous. The Board then took up the only matter for consideration, that being appeals of two parts of the Ed Morse Chevrolet business. Taxpayer named MOI Rolla Prop LLC, of 202 N. Lindsay Rd., Ste 201, Mesa AZ 85213 appealed commercial parcel number 71-09-2.0-10-001-001-004.000, valued by the Assessor at \$2,142,930 with the taxpayer's proposed value of \$1,243,000. The reason for the appeal was valuation. Deputy Assessor Paul Long detailed that in order for that appeal to be heard the valuation needed to come from a certified appraiser within the state of Missouri; it had not and for this reason Long believed that this was invalid. Long also reported that the valuation submitted by the taxpayer was of approximately 25,000 square feet of building and the accurate number was closer to 40,000 square feet. They submitted an appraisal of 25K sq feet of buildings and actually there's more like 40K sq feet of buildings on the property. A certified Missouri appraiser also had not submitted information on the other commercial property, for taxpayer named Fairgrounds Associates Inc of the same address as above bearing parcel number 71-09-2.0-10-001-001-004.001. This commercial parcel on Bryant Road had a market value of \$48,350 set by the Assessor with with a proposed value from the taxpayer of \$27,600. The reason for this appeal was also valuation; Long said it also was invalid due to the lack of certified appraiser work. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp entertained a motion to reject the appeal and sustain the assessor's valuation for both parcels, which was made by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Auxier. The roll call vote was Verkamp - aye; Hicks - aye; Auxier - aye; Cates - aye; Davis - aye; Biele - aye (unanimous). As moved by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Auxier, the meeting adjourned at 0914 on unanimous vote.

Bids in sealed envelopes clearly marked "LP BIDS" on the exterior will be received in the Phelps County Clerk's Office, 200 N. IN THE MATTER OF PUBLIC WATER SEWER DISTRICT #2 AND ARPA FUNDING:

Josh Thompson, manager of Public Water Supply District #2, entered at 0900 with Board President Bill Parsons and Vice Chair Don Friede. Thompson said they were consolidating the Pines and Forest Lakes treatment facilities with an estimated cost of about \$2.3 million; they want to inquire about possible partial support for their project from the County's ARPA funds. Thompson said, "Anything you are going to kick in will be positive for us," as this increases the likelihood of additional support. The reporter was also present. Forest Lakes has a sand filter slated for elimination; Friede said everything is pumped from the residences. All pumps in the area are gray water effluent pumps, as the 525 homes have individual septic systems. Everything is covered by the monthly fee just under \$60, except the individuals have to pay for electric for their own pump and the lateral from the house to the tank. Meeting ammonia limits at The Pines plant-which is the oldest-would be a prohibitively expensive upgrade. The modifications of quantity of effluent are not the major hurdle with DNR; it's the quality especially with respect to ammonia content. Their new plant will be rated at 80,000 gallons/day. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp asked about capacity; Thompson does not think that the Country Club plant will have to brought in, as it only serves about 29 to 30 homes. After some discussion about the County's plans for the ARPA funds, Thompson, Parsons and Friede left at 0920.

IN THE MATTER OF SALES TAXES:

Treasurer Carol Green entered at 0920 to provide the sales tax report for July, 2022. The County 0.5% sales tax revenue for the month was \$312,283.85, up 9.10% and 9.78% in the month-to-month and rolling twelve-month comparisons, respectively.

IN THE MATTER OF ROADS:

As Green exited at 0930 Superintendent of Roads Mark Case, Shawn Pearson and Michelle Bock of the Road and Bridge Department entered. Case met with Donelson Construction Company, LLC to coordinate preparation of roads which Donelson was going to pressure-pave; anything done by the Road Department will be deducted from their final price, Case said. On July 19, he met with Capital Asphalt about Roads 2110 and 8010; they gave a very rough estimate of \$1 million or \$1.1 million to mill the road down 2" and pave 2". Case believes Road 2110 has had minimal maintenance since it was deeded to the county. There are some

definite logistical issues with managing these roads with concrete at the base and some were discussed. In the middle of their work this week a large rock fell onto a road some distance away; a crew with a backhoe hammer and front-end loader had to leave to clear this road. Choice of connector roads for maintenance was then discussed.

IN THE MATTER OF REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS FOR INMATE BANKING AND COMMISSARY SERVICES, RECEIVED:

The Commission received two proposal packets for inmate banking and commissary services. These were from Stellar Services, LLC of Stoughton, WI and Keefe Commissary Network of Bridgeton, MO. These were taken under advisement as moved by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Auxier.

IN THE MATTER OF SHERIFF SALARY:

The clerk discussed the matter of the sheriff's salary with the Commission. Pursuant to RSMo 57.317, modified during the 2021 regular session of the General Assembly, the salary of a thirdclass county sheriff was increased to a given percentage of the associate circuit judge's salary. This percentage depended on the county's assessed valuation; Phelps County falls in the category of 60%. The sheriff was to receive a 5% COLA upon the 2021 salary, making his rate of pay for 2022 \$76,125 annually. However, 60% of the associate circuit judge ("judge") pay as of January 1, 2022 would be \$88,087.20. The law specified that if the sheriff would be receiving more than a \$10,000 raise in annual pay, this raise was to be paid over a period of 5 years as 20% increments. Since the increment was \$11,962.20, the sheriff received 20% of that, or \$2,392.44 making his pay \$78,517.44. The clerk explained that the judge pay always increases effective July 1, which was in the middle of the county's budget year (not to mention in the middle of the sheriff's elected term each time); judge pay was announced to be \$150,035 on 7/1/2022 and this would mean another modification of the sheriff's pay. Payroll dated 7/29/22 will reflect his pay rate on 7/1/2022. Sixty percent of the new judge rate is \$90,021; this is an increment of \$13,896 of which 20% was \$2,779.20. Thus, the sheriff's pay rate was adjusted to \$78,904.20 annually. The prosecuting attorney salary, pursuant to RSMo 56.325, is set at 100% of the judge pay. The clerk will correct a typographical error in the prosecuting attorney's 2022 salary which gave a 5% COLA; the prosecutor is not eligible since is outside the salary commission rules. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp called MAC Prepaid Legal Services Attorney Travis Elliott and this was confirmed by him.

IN THE MATTER OF ACCOUNTS PAYABLE:

The Commissioners reviewed and approved payment of 38 invoices in the amount of \$15,655.19 as well as the Group Benefit Services premium payment of \$127,429.46.
