Sheriff gave example of entering the course at 20 years of age and then take the posttest when you graduate at the age of 21 years of age. Sheriff Advised RTI is now going to be offering a Criminal justice degree which will allow high school students to take the criminal justice classes and then move into the law enforcement academy the following year. Kirn expressed the concern of local Law Enforcement agencies hurting to be able to recruit anyone for the open positions at the local agencies. IN THE MATTER OF FLOODPLAIN MANAGEMENT:

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY ROAD 3620 DRY FORK CREEK BRIDGE:
