IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY CORONER VEHICLE:

Phelps County Coroner Andy Davis reported that the Sheriff's Drug Forfeiture Fund was funding the purchase of a 2017 Ford F-150 from Joe Machens Ford for him, preventing the need for his use of his personal vehicle for transporting remains. On a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks, this was approved.

IN THE MATTER OF COMMUNICATIONS TOWER:

Tri-Leaf Corporation made an inquiry about a proposed site for construction of a 375 foot tall, self-supporting communication tower with associated equipment along the Outer Road at Newburg. The location would be latitude 37 degrees, 56 min. 25.52" N, longitude 91 degrees, 56 min. 30.61" W. IN THE MATTER OF CORONER'S BUDGET:

Phelps County Coroner Andy Davis was in attendance, as were Rolla Daily News Editor John Buckner and Phelps County Focus Staff Writer Andrew Sheeley. Davis reported that last week he reached the end of the \$15,000 which had been budgeted for autopsies in his 2017 budget. A discussion ensued about the requirements for autopsies; Davis stated that two full autopsies had been required just last week. Drug-related deaths from opioid overdoses were discussed.

IN THE MATTER OF 1972 JAIL:

Sheriff Rick Lisenbe came to discuss progress on the 1972 Jail restoration.

IN THE MATTER OF SHERIFF PERSONNEL TRAINING:

Lisenbe discussed the need for firearm range training, and the need for a site. The Missouri Department of Public Safety has very limited capacity and tight scheduling for use of their range. He expressed the need for approximately five acres, perhaps adjoining the National Forest for its seclusion away from residential properties. Options were discussed.

IN THE MATTER OF COURTHOUSE SECURITY:

Lisenbe provided some details of the new, higher-resolution security cameras which were installed to replace older equipment in the courthouse lobby and some other locations.

IN THE MATTER OF EMPLOYEE WELLNESS:

Starlynn Reynolds, R.N. and Jade Chapman, R.N. from Phelps County Regional Medical Center Community Outreach Coordination came to discuss the wellness strategies under review and development in their department. Should the county become a participant, incentives such as decreased or waived copays, and subsidy of all or part of the expense of the programs for participants, were discussed. PCRMC currently is considering offering a modified version of the pilot used with hospital employees. Commissioner Stratman asked about an R.N. from the Health Department perhaps being recruited as a trainer, and Reynolds thought this was certainly worth consideration.

IN THE MATTER OF NORTHWYE:

Darin Pryor, P.E., of the City of Rolla reported to the Commission that All-Type Fence of Steelville wished subcontract the guardrail portion of their contract. On a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks, the employment of D&S Fencing of Desoto, Missouri to complete guardrail was approved. Edna Mae Smith was also present.

IN THE MATTER OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR PAY:

Emergency Management Director Cpl. Mike Kirn of the Phelps County Sheriff's Office informed the Commission that the Emergency Management Performance Grant had been approved; this will provide a 50% match of his contract pay as EMD. After he receives pay, he can submit request for reimbursement. The Accounts Payable clerk will be notified.

The Rolla Area Sheltered Workshop had asked the Phelps County Board for the Developmentally Disabled for additional funding in the amount of \$9600, or \$800 monthly; this was to provide transportation for individuals lacking another means to pay for their transportation to the Workshop. On an inquiry by the clerk, bidding was briefly discussed; a budget amendment will be needed for this prior to the end of the year. On a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks, this additional disbursement was approved.

IN THE MATTER OF RECORD DESTRUCTION:

IN THE MATTER OF DOOLITTLE RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT:

Paul Smith, Mayor of Doolittle and Chair of the Doolittle Rural Fire Protection District board, inquired of the clerk whether a fire district was required to pass an ordinance to set a fire levy. The clerk said this was not required, just a public hearing and a motion passed by the board.

IN THE MATTER OF TOUGH ON TRASH:

Funded by the Tipping Fee at county landfills, the Ozark Regional Solid Waste Management District is requesting Phelps County's 13th annual Tough on Trash grant application. Deputy Clerk Peter Cook intends to request \$12,145 for the coming year. Commissioner Hicks suggested changing the responsibility for recruitment to the Commission, but Cook suggested leaving it a joint responsibility between the Commission and the Road employee involved, as that would allow said employee the option of recruiting community members should the opportunity arise. On a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks, the grant application was approved.

IN THE MATTER OF GASCONADE RIVER ACCESS AT JEROME:

IN THE MATTER OF TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE:

Because Rolla would experience a near-total solar eclipse in the early afternoon of August 21, 2017, some office holders inquired about office closing. Collector Davis Haas, Assessor Bill Stoltz, Public Administrator Kathy Oliver, and Recorder Robin Kordes attended. The Health Department will be closed from noon to 2:00 p.m. Kordes said that Franklin and Boone Counties are closing from 12:30 to 2:00 p.m.; they are experiencing a total eclipse. Classes at the Missouri S&T are not universally cancelled; it is the first day of the fall semester.

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY INVESTMENTS:

The Commission deliberated on who would be a candidate for training on this program; the current clerk received little or no training in this very complex and non-intuitive system. Her payroll and accounts payable clerks have received some training, but for the most part have had hands-on training and are more self-taught. Everyone in the clerk's office and even personnel in some other departments who have privileges that might be described as "read-only" have had multiple complaints with the New World software; the company was

acquired in late 2015 by Tyler Technologies. Tyler has long marketed a smaller, less complex financial software package known as Encode, used by many of Phelps' neighboring counties. New World currently has only one user in Missouri, the City of St. Louis having ceased using it. It does, however, have users in other states, particularly Michigan. On a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks, the contract for training was approved. The second contract, for annual maintenance, was for over \$25,000.00 and included several milestones that the county has been paying for but has never used, such as Financial Analytics and Payroll Analytics. These together cost over \$2,500.00 annually. There are other milestones that may also need to be eliminated from the billing of the county.

Local officials and residents were contacted by phone from the meeting by Presiding Commissioner Verkamp to notify them of the opening, to occur Tuesday, August 29, 2017 at the east end of the road segment at 9:00 a.m. Superintendent of Roads Walter Snelson reported that the seeding to be done returned an estimate over \$11,000; this was felt far in excess of typical rates locally and the Commission recommended that bids be obtained.

IN THE MATTER OF PHELPS COUNTY SHERIFF:

Sheriff Rick Lisenbe stopped by to discuss plans for storage of groundskeeping equipment by his department.

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY LAND:

Presiding Commissioner Verkamp reported that the interested buyer for the land at the intersection of roads 1050 and 1080 was in the process of completing preparatory paperwork.

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY INVESTMENTS:

Treasurer Carol Green came to discuss a visit to the Commission from a representative of MoSIP, Missouri Securities Investment Program. MoSIP provides school districts, municipalities, counties, and other political subdivisions with effective tools for meeting their cash flow and investment needs.

IN THE MATTER OF TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE:

Local resident Chester Kojro came to relate his experiences seeing the total solar eclipse that was visible across a diagonal swath of the state on Monday, August 21, 2017.

IN THE MATTTER OF 2017 FLOOD DISASTER:

John Buckner, Editor of the Rolla Daily News, and Andrew Sheeley, Staff Writer for the Phelps County Focus, were present. The clerk reported two early payments for DR 4317, the April-May 2017 declared flood disaster, totaling \$8,579.42 for road work.

IN THE MATTER OF MERAMEC REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION:

Commissioner Hicks reported on the morning's meeting with MRPC, the first of several "Meramec Morning" gatherings planned.

IN THE MATTER OF CART FUNDS:

Treasurer Carol Green reported on the CART funds for the month, receipts being \$62,117.59, \$15,872.61, and \$6,661.16 for gas tax, motor vehicle sales tax, and motor vehicle fees, respectively.

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY INVESTMENTS:

Green also briefly discussed the Missouri Securities Investment Program (MoSIP), offering 0.99% as opposed to the current institution's 0.3% interest rate on checking. Their CD rate is currently 1.52%, compared to the county's current rate of 0.95%. Fees were not available, however. An informational presentation from MoSIP is being scheduled.

IN THE MATTER OF NEW WORLD/TYLER TECHNOLOGIES:

Green also provided information about the state of the maintenance contract negotiations with the company, which provides the county's financial software:

IN THE MATTER OF NATIONAL RESOURCE CONSERVATION SERVICE:

John Feistner, Teresa Woods, and Malinda Burch with the NRCS came to discuss the preliminary damage survey reports needed for application for streambank stabilization funding. The projects being considered are along Roads 7550 and 7360. Feistner had one copy of draft documents which he felt might materially change; preliminarily, there was not a benefit-cost ratio above 1.0. Though a ratio above 1.0 ordinarily is needed for

approval, when questioned by Presiding Commissioner Verkamp, Feistner felt the projects were likely to be eligibile. Feistner said he had an incomplete understanding of why some projects would be considered for funding and others not; he also suggested that the federal agency might accumulate requests for funding to a certain amount and then approve an award. Discussion regarding prioritization of requests followed. Local resident Curt Voss and Coroner Andy Davis then entered. Buckner asked if bundling the projects increased the likelihood of funding; Commissioner Hicks said that Road 7360 was a bus route and flooding had closed the road and created transportation difficulties from that standpoint. This was followed by a detailed discussion about the application process, use of local forces, deadlines, labor rates, non-coverage of engineering costs, and memoranda of understanding.

IN THE MATTER OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR:

Public Administrator Kathy Oliver reported to the Commission that a local bank has asked her to perform conservator duties for free, which she cannot do without a court order and a fee.

IN THE MATTER OF CLOSED SESSION:

On a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks, the meeting entered closed session pursuant to RSMo 610.021 (3), for a personnel matter. The meeting returned to open session at 1120 on a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks.

IN THE MATTER OF PHELPS/MARIES HEALTH DEPARTMENT DIRECTOR:

Outgoing Phelps/Maries Health Department Director Michelle Steinkamp came to discuss salary arrangements as she tapers off her involvement, for herself, and for Assistant Director Ashley Wann as she assumes more responsibility.

IN THE MATTER OF PHELPS/MARIES HEALTH DEPARTMENT FOOD CODE:

Steinkamp said she would be visiting with the Maries County Commission about her proposed food code on Thursday, August 31, 2017. She is being advised in the drafting of the code by the Phelps County Prosecutor's office.

IN THE MATTER OF PHELPS COUNTY CORONER:

Deputy Clerk for Accounts Payable Shell Howard requested and received clarification for the use of the county credit card for a purchase by Coroner Andy Davis; funding was approved already. This would be for a special stretcher for the back of the new vehicle he will be using.

The address for Carla Bates is 13605 South US Highway 63; she said that a deputy with the Phelps County Sheriff's Department told them they could not park cars in their own driveway because the address was 13605 Private Drive 7136. This private drive parallels their driveway, also in an east-west direction but to the north; the western end of this private drive, however, is no longer continuous with the western end of their driveway which has its terminus on the property occupied by Clarence Bates. Tim Kean, PMM, GIS Coordinator for Phelps County, came to the meeting and clarified to all present that this has already been corrected in the Assessor's records. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp called the PCSD to make them aware of the newer and more limited extent of the private drive.

IN THE MATTER OF DRONE FOOTAGE OF NORTHWYE OUTER ROAD:

Local resident Chester Crider shared drone still photos and video footage obtained at the Northwye Outer Road dedication. Also present were local resident Chester Kojro.

IN THE MATTER OF PHELPS/MARIES HEALTH DEPARTMENT DIRECTOR:

Director Michelle Steinkamp came to discuss wage arrangements as

She separates from County employment. Commissioner Stratman suggested she assume status as an hourly contract employee, with no withholding and no benefits. He urged her to seek direction from Assistant Director Ashley Wann, soon to become Interim Director, with regard to the number of hours she would be needed. Steinkamp will work on preparing a contract.

IN THE MATTER OF RECOGNITION OF STATE SENATOR DR. DAN BROWN:

Presiding Commissioner Randy Verkamp called Dent County Presiding Commissioner Darrell Skiles about scheduling a presentation to be made to State Senator Dr. Dan Brown.

IN THE MATTER OF OATH OF OFFICE FOR INTERIM HEALTH DEPARTMENT DIRECTOR:

Ashley Wann was sworn in as Interim Health Department Director by the clerk, taking the oath prescribed by MO Constitution Article VII Section 11.

IN THE MATTER OF PROPOSED FOOD CODE:

Interim Director Ashley Wann said the proposed food code will be presented to Maries County on Thursday, August 31. Steinkamp said that unlike the Missouri Food Code, her code includes the frequency of inspection and credentialing of food establishment employees. Currently the City of Rolla has the authority to close a food establishment but the County does not; the code will give the County that same authority. If the City of Rolla adopts a code under the County, the city would lose their enforcement capability; this would devolve to the County. Steinkamp said that with the State and their due process procedures, closure can take up to two weeks; she believes she could close establishments much more quickly. Steinkamp also believes she has a more detailed appeals process written into her proposed code. The city code has a fee structure based on gross sales, and not on risk; Steinkamp believes that risk-based fees are worth consideration, possibly even better and more reflective of the time her department will have to invest. In answer to a question posed by Commissioner Hicks, she said that sanitarian charges and food service permits have thus far brought in approximately \$20,000 this year. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp asked about Hancock Amendment compliance, and Steinkamp reported that counsel from the Prosecuting Attorney's office said Hancock did not apply as the funds were not receipted into the General Revenue Fund. Subsequently there was a lengthy discussion of a recent gas station fire and the length of time required for inspection of that facility; number of establishments outside the city of Rolla (approximately 40 percent); number of inspections for one-day events; mobile vendors; proposed new inspections under her code; farmer's markets exempt often under the Cottage Law; food handler training; no fees prescribed by Missouri Food Code.

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IN THE MATTER OF COLLECTOR'S COURT ORDER:

On a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks, Collector's Court Order Certificate 2016-000038 Parcel 2016-7906 was approved.

IN THE MATTER OF 1972 JAIL RENOVATION:

Rolla Daily News Editor John Buckner and Phelps County Focus Staff Writer Andrew Sheeley were present. Phelps County Sheriff Rick Lisenbe discussed developments in the 1972 Jail renovation.

IN THE MATTER OF RIDGEVIEW EXTENSION MISSOURI HIGHWAY 72:

Local resident Alfred Chapman inquired if the planning and zoning of the Ridgeview Extension by the City of Rolla would permit commercial development on both sides.

IN THE MATTER OF ROAD 8220:

Chapman asked when his road, County Road 8220, would be resurfaced. This led to a discussion of sources for gravel, the widely-held opinion locally that the Gasconade River channel was badly overdue for dredging and the fact that the state Department of Natural Resources was the primary reason this was not being achieved. Chapman said that he recalls a time when gravel plants were found every 10 miles on the Gasconade River, and Special Road and Bridge could be supplied with all the gravel needed from these plants. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp confirmed by telephone with the Road Department that Road 8220 was not on the list for 2017; Chapman requested his road be put on the list for 2018. He stated the road width was decreasing little by little with the work of the snowplows; he maintains that this road is used as a cutoff between County Road 8170 and Highway C.

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY PROPERTY IN JEROME:

Local resident James Tomnitz came to inquire of the Commission whether county-owned property in Jerome would ever be sold. Since this property fell to the County under the flood buy-out agreement, the Commission told him it could not ever be sold or developed.

IN THE MATTER OF MILEAGE REIMBURSEMENTS:

In response to a query from the clerk, the Commission said that requests for mileage reimbursements from County employees should have the origin, destination, date and purpose on the request.

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IN THE MATTER OF COURTHOUSE LOST AND FOUND:

The clerk said her office would keep items left in the Courthouse for 30 days in a lost and found box, at which time they would be donated to charity.

IN THE MATTER OF WORKER'S COMPENSATION:

Deputy Clerk Tessa Piatt spoke with the Commission about alternatives for evaluation and treatment after workplace injuries. Recently an employee suffering a workplace injury had been evaluated at the hospital and given a follow-up appointment; he was refused when he returned for said appointment. This caused confusion and frustration. Hospital emergency room care is much more expensive for the County than care at the Mercy clinic (MyMercy) or the Rolla Family Clinic, and wait times are much longer. Piatt believes that employees need to appreciate the savings of their time and the County's costs when the emergency room can be reserved for major injuries. Commissioner Stratman said he was somewhat reluctant to tell people where to seek treatment; he said it should be emphasized as a suggestion. She will continue working on a handout to provide employees, reminding them that they have a choice to make for some injuries.

IN THE MATTER OF SENIOR COMPANIONS:

Senior Companions Director Jan Wiggins presented a memorandum of understanding with St. James Living Center, which was on a motion by Commissioner Hicks, seconded by Commissioner Stratman.

IN THE MATTER OF ROAD DEPARTMENT EQUIPMENT:

Michelle Bock of the Road and Bridge Department reported that a replacement loader had been located on the online auction site Purple Wave. A 2000 John Deere with 2800 hours, recent significant upkeep, an encouraging video of the equipment being used, this equipment's purchase was quite time-sensitive due to the mechanism of sale. An adequate balance exists in Fund 102, Road and Bridge Debt Service; the plan was to transfer funds to Fund 100. There will be a budget amendment to reflect this. The purchase needs to be made with a wire transfer for the \$40,000.00 price plus \$4,000.00 buyer's premium. Treasurer Carol Green was called into the meeting to discuss the arrangements that needed to be made, and she will personally see to the wire transfer being arranged with the bank. On a motion by Commissioner Stratman, seconded by Commissioner Hicks, this purchase was approved.

IN THE MATTER OF CLOSED SESSION:
