Local residents Ray Schweikhardt and Travis Bahr were present as was the Focus reporter. Assessor Bill Stoltz entered at 0905.

IN THE MATTER OF MU EXTENSION:

Rachel Buenemann of the MU Extension entered at 0910 to invite the Commission to the Extension Trivia Contest and Annual Dinner. She also presented information on the Cooking Matters classes offered which targets SNAP-eligible adults and allows them to experiment with recipes without buying large quantities of ingredients. She is also beginning a food preparation class in Salem. Buenemann left at 0925.

IN THE MATTER OF REAL ESTATE COURT ORDER:

As moved by Commissioner Auxier and seconded by Commissioner Hicks a court order removing \$1,461.68 in sewer bills by Certificate 2021000042 for Parcel Number 2021 - 5137 was approved. The Focus reporter left at 0940.

IN THE MATTER OF CITIZEN INPUT (CHESTER KOJRO):

Local resident Chester Kojro entered at 0925 and asked about DOR rules regarding single year versus multiple year vehicle registrations. Schweikhardt left at 1000.

IN THE MATTER OF JAIL EXPANSION:

Sheriff Kirn and Jail Administrator Joe Taylor entered at 1015 with a draft architect agreement for the building addition on the jail. Kirn laid out his plans for expansion; the Western Federal Marshall's service has extreme need for jail space. His target is 160 federal inmates. Reimbursement rate for federal prisoners was finalized at \$83 per day. CAP, the Cooperative Agreement Program through the Federal Marshall's service, will potentially supply up to a \$5 million grant for the jail expansion. The total estimate for the add-on is \$13.2 million. The timetable was discussed. With respect to the jail

refurbishing, they are working on the second pod. Local resident Paul Myers entered at 1025.

IN THE MATTER OF PCSD ARPA REQUEST FOR RADIOS:

Presiding Commissioner Verkamp asked how crucial the radio application was; Kirn said he did not want to use forfeiture money for the radios; that this was earmarked for the jail expansion and he wanted to retain a "cushion" in the event that the federal prisoner revenue disappeared for 2, 3 even 4 months. His hope is to accept medically fragile prisoners in the 1972 jail building, potentially; their reimbursement rate is quite high.

IN THE MATTER OF COLLECTOR AND VICIOUS, THREATENING OR DESTRUCTIVE ANIMAL ORDINANCE:

Collector Faith Barnes came to thank the Commission for the Vicious, Threatening or Destructive animal ordinance [Ordinance 2018-12-13(1)] because on the night of March 31/April 1 their 5 goats were slaughtered by two neighbor dogs. The sheriff's deputy was quite helpful. Barnes left at 1040.

IN THE MATTER OF PETITION FOR VACATION OF A PORTION OF ROAD 3340:

The Commission conducted the final reading for the petition to vacate a portion of Road 3340 as filed by Paul Myers and signed by 12 resident voters of the Dillon Township. Responding to a question from Presiding Commissioner Verkamp, Myers said that the road has been surveyed just recently. The hammerhead will be installed immediately west of the driveway of Bruce and Mildred Ponzer, who are also signatories on the petition. Myers said they would ensure this was constructed "before the snow flies." No remonstrance was heard at the hearing. As moved by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Auxier, this road vacation was approved unanimously. Legal description of the vacation was recommended.

Dana Sooter entered at 1020 to request secure storage of materials of considerable value with wards' estates. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp called Sissy Korich who arrived at 1030 and participated in further discussion.

IN THE MATTER OF COURTHOUSE UTILIZATION:

Korich discussed the movement of the COSP office. Acting Superintendent of Roads Mark Case and Michelle Bock of the Road and Bridge Department entered at 1035.

IN THE MATTER OF ELECTION TRUCK TAMPERING:

The clerk reported on an incident from the previous day. The polling place take-down crew had returned with roughly half of the equipment used in the April 5, 2022 General Municipal election at 1230, parking their pickup and trailer in the usual spot along the curb of the northern limb of the courthouse circle. Equipment was unloaded. They remained in the courthouse for lunch until 1310. On returning to the truck, the blue vinyl bank bag used to hold the polling place keys was missing and found, after a 20-minute search of the immediate area, in a nearby trashcan. None of the polling place keys were missing; the laborers had kept election equipment keys on their persons and not in this bag. A bailiff was summoned; the entire truck/trailer and the driveway leading to the trash can were visible on the Camera 2 feed on the Collector's website. The bailiff did not have any access to this camera's recording. Rolla Police Department was notified and they arrived and took a statement from the junior member of the crew, Jacob Andrus. No statement was taken from driver Lewis Hall nor the clerk. The officer said he would be contacting the Collector to determine if there was a recording available from the rooftop cameras. The clerk said this camera was paid for with \$62.40 monthly from the 2% delinquent property tax fee paid to the Collector's Tax Maintenance Fund, and in her opinion, taxpayers should have access to a recording of a camera on the roof of the taxpayer's courthouse. More than 20 hours had elapsed since her police report and she had no follow-up from RPD. This is the second time the election truck and trailer have been tampered with at election time. Nothing was forthcoming from the prior police report several years earlier.

Kirn reported that the second prisoner "pod" was completed. Kirn reported that the DEA Cooperative Agreement Program (CAP) grant had been approved between the Sheriff and the U.S. Marshall's Office. An application is being made for \$5 million for new construction; revenue bonds will be sold, he said, to financial institutions and the source of revenue will be the per diem increase and the numerical increase for federal prisoners. The County will have no obligation with these bond payments. Also presented by Kirn was a draft agreement with an architecture firm for the jail expansion.

IN THE MATTER OF LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY:

IN THE MATTER OF ROADS:

Travis Elliott also spoke about the \$10 million allowance which must be voted by the Commission. Sissy Korich and Chris Reeder entered at 1120. Green will get the verbiage from staff at MRPC. Green said Travis cautioned the counties regarding federal procurement guidelines, particularly with respect to capital improvements. Sheriff Kirn said that George K. Baum has been consulted regarding the revenue bond design; the CAP funding, should it be available, could be used to pay down the bond without penalty. He has been told that the CAP award is nearly a certainty. Kliethermes said currently International, Kenworth, and Freightliner are only allotted so many vehicles to build in a year and additional orders are pushed forward. There are significant difficulties with supply chains. Procurement using Sourcewell was discussed.

IN THE MATTER OF RIDGELINE DRIVE:

An inquiry having been made by John Ethridge on behalf of Rolla VFW Post 2025 regarding this road, the Commissioners said that the roadway had been accepted as part of the plat but never adopted as a road for County maintenance. The monthly amount is up 14.17% in the month-to-month (MTM) comparison. Green left at 0908 just as Phelps County Sheriff's Department Lt. Chris Finch and Jail Lt. Joe Taylor entered.

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY LAND SALE, PCSD SHOOTING RANGE:

Finch asked for clarification about the closing costs of a small 0.04 ac, m/l, parcel from the NW corner of the new PCSD shooting range; the Commission informed him that their original intent was for the buyer to pay these and this is what is reflected in the March 29, 2022 minutes. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp reported that Doctors Joe and Cathy Bond had agreed to this. Some discussion ensued about the location of pins, etc. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp spoke by phone with Ex-Officio Land Commissioner Terris Cates about a number of the details. Cates will be bringing the deed by later in the morning.

IN THE MATTER OF JAIL EXPANSION AGREEMENT:

The AIA (American Institute of Architects) Agreement between the Phelps County Sheriff's Department and the Goldberg Group Architects, Professional Corporation of St. Joseph, MO for the Phelps County, MO Law Enforcement Center Addition was signed by Presiding Commissioner Verkamp. The Construction Manager for the project is to be determined. Finch and Taylor left at 0935.

IN THE MATTER OF LAND PURCHASE, ARPA FUNDS:

Presiding Commissioner Verkamp signed the settlement statement for the parcel at 11780 County Road 3080; this nearly 3 acre tract immediately west of a parcel owned by the County and used as a supply depot, of sorts, was purchased from Billie K. Davis for \$150,000 in ARPA funds.

IN THE MATTER OF AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) APPLICATION, CITY OF ST. JAMES REQUEST NUMBER 3 (LIFT STATION):

Presiding Commissioner Verkamp contacted Kelly Sink at MRPC to notify her of the final decision to provide \$250,000 of the

County's ARPA funds to the city of St. James for part of their expense for a new lift station #3.

IN THE MATTER OF ROAD WORK PLANNING:

Acting Superintendent of Roads Mark Case and Michelle Bock of the Road & Bridge Department entered at 1005 to review plans for road maintenance. Because of looming construction along County Road 8490, maintenance may be delayed due to the inevitable wear-and-tear on the surface by heavy trucking. Also discussed was the proposed hot-deck overlay of Road 1000 between Highway B and Highway U. The westernmost 1300 feet would cost roughly \$20,000 and St. James City Administrator Jim Fleming was contacted about this fairly short-notice matter; since paving will start on April 27, a special session of the city council will be needed. Fleming will reply with more details. Road 7240 was next discussed; Commissioner Hicks called a property owner there who is building; they have 80% of their concrete poured but the owner said that they had "a year's worth of construction left to go."

Presiding Commissioner Verkamp left at 1100 for Wiggins Abstract for the closing on property. Phelps/Maries Health Department Director Ashley Campbell entered at 1105.

IN THE MATTER OF PHELPS/MARIES HEALTH DEPARTMENT:

Upon Presiding Commissioner Verkamp's return at 1130 Campbell asked the Commissioners about the hours of the Health Department being maintained as 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. M-F; she says the commonest complaint of the public is that they "close before I can get there after work." She is thinking about switching to a M-Th for the clinical staff with longer hours to permit serving people after work. She says only 2 of her staff live close enough to go home for lunch; 30-minute lunch hours may work and she is investigating 0730 to 1800 which would be a 10-hour day, probably closing on Mondays since Fridays are now fairly consistently busier than Mondays. She plans to survey some of her clients to see how such a change would appeal to them. Campbell is thinking about her LabCorp lab services and discussed electronic medical records. Campbell left at 1155.

IN THE MATTER OF PINE HILL CEMETERY:

Local resident Ron Nappier entered at 1155 to ask about a family cemetery. The recorder informed him that it had been deeded to the County in 1886; there is an effort to care for it as a non-profit but there has been difficulty in obtaining a tax ID number. He visited the recorder to find out who owned the cemetery; it turned out to be the County. He was referred to his attorney.

IN THE MATTER OF VICTIMS:

IN THE MATTER OF ROAD FACILITY:

On inquiry from the Focus reporter, the plans for the new road facility on Road 3080 was discussed. Local residents Ray Schweikhardt and Travis Bahr were also present. When asked for the timeline, Presiding Commissioner Verkamp said that the engineering firm had been retained; Commissioner Hicks discussed some of the considerations for storage. Commissioner Auxier said the attraction was being out of town and Sheeley remarked that the availability of the ARPA Funds really made it possible. Local resident Chester Crider entered at 0920 just as Sheeley left.

IN THE MATTER OF PINE HILL CEMETERY:

Crider said the people now in charge of the Pine Hill Cemetery took over in 1992. The plot book was burned many years ago and he is unsure, now, of all the names of the individuals interred there. Crider's family was heavily represented on the cemetery board; after someone moved, he assumed the treasurer's position. As such, he has received notification of the interest earned on two CD's held by the association and its reporting to the IRS. This means the association has funds and they are considering the best way forward, to establish a non-profit, for the care of the cemetery. Crider mentioned the county's ownership of the cemetery; he believes that the early residents associated with the Snelson-Brinker cabin (now burned) as well as some Trail of Tears Indian migrants may be buried there; a surveyor is planning to mark the corners and may also be able to conduct soundings to detect gravesites. Local resident Chester Kojro entered at 0935. Crider exited at 0950.

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY LAND SALE:

Pro-rated estimated property taxes for the property of Billie K. Davis at 11780 County Road 3080 were paid through Wiggins Abstract; these amounted to roughly \$240 and will be forwarded to the Collector.

IN THE MATTER OF ROAD 2300:

Local resident Scott White had expressed a concern about Kenny Lane, his term for the east-west limb of Private Drive 2305, both in terms of its narrowness and its use by trash haulers who back along its course "in the middle of the night." White had inquired about the County improving this roadway; as it had never been accepted into the County road inventory it was

pointed out that this would not be undertaken. Road 2030 is in the County inventory; Private Drive 2305 is not. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp will communicate this to White.

IN THE MATTER OF ROAD 1000:

Michelle Bock of the Road Department contacted Presiding Commissioner Verkamp by phone to report that the city of St. James lacked budgeted funds to complete the western end of this paving project on Road 1000; furthermore, if the Road Department is to avoid impending wet weather more trucks are needed which will necessitate contract hauling. The bid winner has no trucks available and another local company has trucks but charges more per hour. Presiding Commissioner Verkamp said that this segment might be paid from ARPA funds. Kojro left at 1045.

IN THE MATTER OF COLLECTOR:

Collector Faith Barnes entered at 1050 and rendered an opinion about pro-rated taxes for properties sold by private parties to tax-exempt entities mid-way through a year. Then Barnes said that there was personal property tax debt of two year's duration on the town MFA property; she said personal property taxes followed the person; MFA is defunct and First State Community Bank acquired the vehicles (according to their tags) and they might be liable for the property taxes. This is a sum of about \$3000. She knows that two of the vehicles were sold by FSCB. Travis Bahr said that MFA Inc. in Columbia "cut their credit off" and refused to allow them to purchase any more inventory.

IN THE MATTER OF PAYROLL:

The Commissioners reviewed and approved payroll for April 30, representing work dates 4/1-15/2022 with \$222,364.73 net wages, \$68,034.55 (federal) and \$9,377.50 (state) withholdings.
